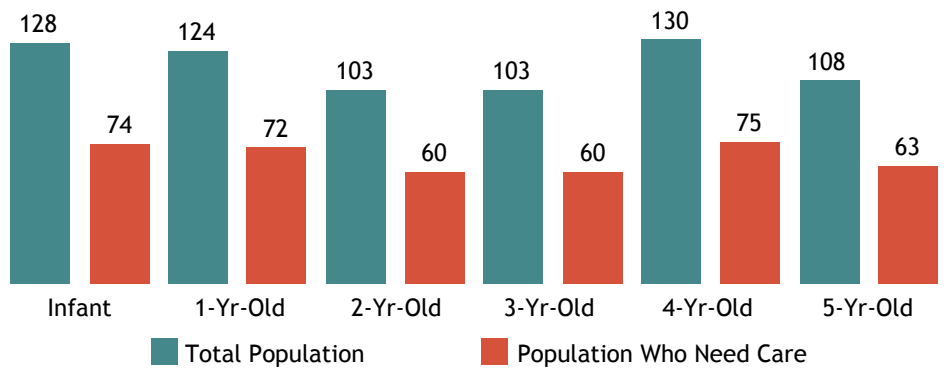

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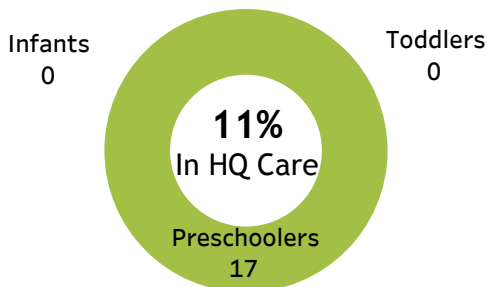


HOW MANY YOUNG CHILDREN LIVE IN THE COUNTY AND NEED CARE?

HOW MANY CHILDREN ARE ENROLLED IN HIGH-QUALITY PROGRAMS BY AGE?

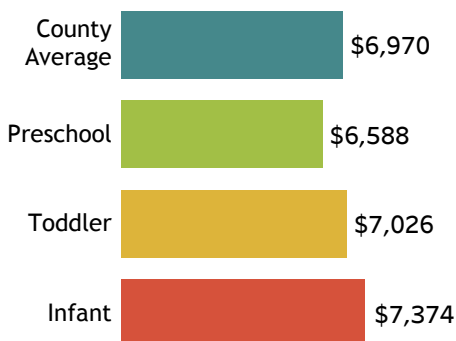

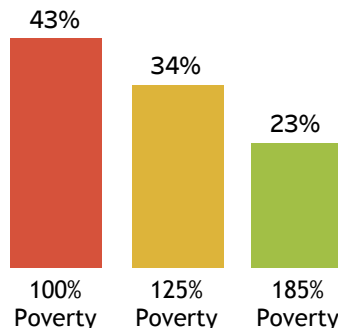

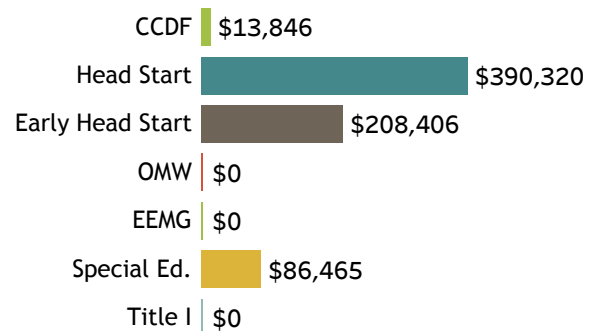
